Introduction

Demands and transition to distance (remote) teaching/learning in short time due to Coronavirus pandemic is tough. We all moved online quickly, experienced disruptions and new working conditions over the last couple of months. Demands for remote teaching/learning as part of the digital transformation will probably extend in post-pandemic era. This topic is inevitable one in any further discussion and envisioning of the social work (digital) education future, especially development of e-pedagogies in a post-pandemic world.

Social work educators and researchers as podcasters

Some suggestions about using podcast for teaching and research purposes:

- Popularize your research by telling it as a story (public outreach).
- Use podcast as a tool for exercising public intellectual role.
- Grow your audience based on your niche research topic.
- Interview your "dream guests" in a subject-specific podcast episode.
- Share a book review using podcast.

Create engaging learning content using short (6 min) podcast episodes featuring key concept or break down complicated reading material, pose higher-level questions for students, etc.

Screencasting

Screencast videos are actual recordings of your computer screen or tablet as opposed to a video of an in-person lecture¹.

Some suggestions about using podcast for teaching and research purposes:

- > Popularize your research by telling it as a visual story communicated to a public audience.
- Share your research in a new way. Turn an existing power point presentation of your research into a powerful screencast video, include it on your personal webpage, and reach new audience beyond specific conference audience.
- Cultivate engagement in distance learning by two simple strategies enabled with instructional videos: embedded questions and guided notes.
- Build your own instructional videos. Save time to answer repeating questions, break down complex theoretical concepts in 6 minutes long screencast videos, which students can pause and re-watch it.

In the blog post <u>Everything You Need to Know About Building a Great Screencast Video</u>, educator Kareem Farah talks about screencasts in a friendly-user manner. In his view, building your own screencast video is one of the most effective ways to move instructions online. Still, he recognizes barriers that prevent educators from making a smoother transition to distance learning. Therefore, Farah put together the tips to help guide you through the process of creating screencast videos. You

Finding the Right Recording Tool

There are many screencast products with similar functionality, such as Screencast-O-Matic, Camtasia, OBS, etc. Some of these are open source (e.g. OBS), some are available as free and paid version (e.g. Screencast-O-Matic) or only as paid version with free trial (Camtasia). Besides, some paid versions are more affordable than the others.

Therefore, we recommend you check first your university pages to find out to which <u>screen</u> recording and video editing software you already have access to.


Digisosiaalityön verkkokurssi (Pelastakaa Lapset ry.)
